is not yet quite well again.

Dear Mario,

Many thanks for your ~~paper~~ letter of 27 January 1971 which (no doubt due to the postal strike) arrived only this morning. I am replying immediately.

I think I must tell you first that I am out of touch with my former department. As you know, I was on very friendly terms with them for many, many years. But on my retirement, they behaved like fiends. I had for the ~~last two years~~ ^{before my retirement left} everything to them, administration, appointments, etc, though I was always at their disposal when they needed me. But on my retirement, they behaved so badly - and ever since - that I ultimately talked to Watkins about it who in a letter admitted it all and apologized. But this has not led to any change.

About Lakatos I do not really want to speak. He lied to me and misled me; but, what is more important, he told his students lies about me. I wrote to him a letter about three months ago. He sent me a message by word of mouth that he will reply within 6 days; but he has not done so. (The Postal Strike has nothing to do with this.)

I am sure he has succumbed ^{to} the great occupational disease of so many philosophers: he has become a megalomaniac.

I am of course very sad and very hurt about these developments. It is not so much that they have thrown me on the rubbish heap. The queer thing is that there is now a rivalry among them as to who was the
